ENGLISH ADVENTURERS

John Reade of Shadwell, Stepney, Middlesex, sailor aged 38. (2 depositions). He was foremastman of the Hope.

James Hayes of Dartmouth, Devon, where he has lived for the past 3 years, merchant aged 34. In December 1669 he went aboard the <u>Hope</u> at Virginia as ship's merchant intending for Barbados.

JOHN DUNCAN v. THE BLACK EAGLE. 28 December 1671 to 26 May 1673.

Thomas Beckett of Stepney, Middlesex, where he has lived for 19 years, porter (bajulator) aged 44. The Black Eagle, which he knows well, has lain in the Thames since June 1670 when she returned from a voyage to Virginia. She is now in a rotting condition and if she lies much longer will be worthless.

Daniel Page of Wapping, Middlesex, where he has lived for 2 years and 6 months, porter aged 35. John Duncan was Master of the Black Eagle.

John Duncan of Wapping, Middlesex, sailor aged 50. He was Master of the Black Eagle from June to September 1671 and incurred expenditure for her, including wages, of £742.

William Roe of Wapping, Middlesex, distiller aged 28. Duncan was arrested and imprisoned for debt in the Poultry and the deponent went bail for him.

Tobias Rammorter of St. Botolph, Aldgate, London, merchant aged 52. He is a merchant and broker for ships' masters and deposes re wages paid to the company of the Black Eagle.

Humphrey Whyle of Wapping, Middlesex, sailor aged 46. He was in Virginia in 1670 when Duncan came there with his ship and knows that he paid £29 in Virginia duties by order of Mr. Theophilus Bland, and paid the whole cost of rebuilding his ship there.
